



Randy Manery

Randy played his first NHL game for the Detroit Red Wings, but he played only two other games for the team over the next two seasons. In the 1972 expansion draft, the Atlanta Flames drafted the defenseman. With the Flames, Randy was a solid and steady d-man who could move the puck and provided leadership. Randy spent 5 seasons in the south and averaged 34 points per season, a very good number for a quiet performer. In fact, he played in the all-star game in 1973.

After the 1977-78 season, Randy was traded to the Los Angeles Kings where he was their number one defenseman. His first two seasons in LA, Randy, ever the consistent player, again averaged 34 points per season as he did in Atlanta. His final season in LA, Manery's performance dropped off and he discovered that he was suffering from an iron deficiency. He retired after that 1979-80 season.

Randy's brother, Kris, also had a strong NHL career playing 250 NHL games.

Manery spent many years as the Executive Director of the Haggai Institute, an organization that recruits and trains Christian leaders around the world.
