


Thomas "Hollywood" Henderson

Thomas Henderson, who no longer goes by the moniker "Hollywood", is one of the world's best speakers on addiction ... because he was once one of the world's biggest offenders.

In the mid-1970's Henderson was one of football's most electrifying and polarizing athletes as a star for the mighty Dallas Cowboys. He had speed which was previously unseen at the linebacker position; and he hit opposing players like a runaway truck. He was also known for his controversial comments which he backed up with his play. He was a Super Bowl Champ and a Pro Bowl selection in 1978.

However what few knew was that Thomas was a functioning cocaine addict who snorted liquid cocaine from an inhaler hidden in his uniform. His self-inflicted slide into the abyss of addiction is chronicled in his first book titled



"Out of Control" which describes his countless encounters with cocaine and alcohol. Eventually Henderson was charged with a

felony and spent 28 months in prison. It was at this time that Thomas made the life-saving decision to get sober.


His second book, "In Control", describes the steps Thomas took to get and remain sober. And he remains sober from November 8, 1983 until this very day, a time period now in excess of 35 years. Addiction can be overcome!

Henderson now loves to help other addicts. He is completely transparent about his faults and misdeeds, not glamourizing them but being accountable for the pain and suffering he caused his family, teammates and friends.
