

Jim Lonborg

Jim hit his stride in 1967 when he went 22-9, won the Cy Young Award, was named an all-star and pitched a one-hitter in the World Series against the St. Louis Cardinals. Pitchers don't come much better than that.

Jim pitched for 15 seasons in the majors with the Boston Red Sox, Milwaukee Brewers and Philadelphia Phillies. Over that time, he won 157 games with a respectable 3.86 ERA.

After his great 1967 season, Jim slumped in his next three seasons in Boston but rebounded in 1971 but was traded to the Brewers for the 1972 season. After a 14-win season with Milwaukee, he was flipped to the Phillies where he played the remaining seven years of his career and achieved 17 and 18 win seasons.

Jim, a very intelligent and articulate man is a graduate of Stanford University and Tufts Dental School. He is now a practicing dentist.

Jim was selected to the Boston Red Sox Hall of Fame in 2002.
